Mathematics

Consider this:

Three people check into a hotel room. The clerk says the bill is \$30, so each guest pays \$10. Later the clerk realizes the bill should only be \$25, so he gives the bellhop \$5 to return to the guests. The morally flexible bellhop, realizing a) \$5 cannot be split three ways equally, and b) the guests don't know of the revised bill, decides to just give each guest \$1 and keep \$2 as a tip for himself. Each guest got \$1 back, and has now only paid \$9, bringing the total paid to \$27. The bellhop has \$2. $\$27 + \$2 = \$29$. But if the guests originally handed over \$30, what happened to the remaining \$1?

While problems like this are the bane of many students' existence, teachers from all subject areas seek to provide students with the strategies and critical thinking skills to best tackle tricky word problems like this. Strategies and skills that are first learned in primary school are built upon from Year 7 onwards and often called upon to help students during difficult assessments such as the OLNAs and Year 12 ATAR examinations that have just passed, as well as the upcoming Year 11 ATAR exams. Terms 3 and 4 fly by so quickly and there is so much on the line for many of our upper school students that I hope many of you reading this have been (or are soon) able to exhale. I know our unimpeachable EA, Tracey Simpson, finally did after hours of work spent with our Year 11 OLNAs students. Thank you to Tracey, congratulations to all Year 12 students, and good luck to those soon to sit upcoming exams.

As we head down the home stretch of another school year, there are still exciting things coming up in the Maths Department. Over the next month we'll have hundreds of Year 6 students from local primary schools coming in for fun activities as they start their transition to secondary school orientation (see below). In amongst that, our Year 7-10s will be submitting their statistics posters from last term's Statistical Investigation

unit. Students from Baldivis Secondary College have been stars on both the national and international stage over the past two years, earning two honourable mentions at the national SSA competition and a gold medal at the international ISLP competition! Science Fair Incursion



Scientists from Murdoch University (Physicist, Biologist and Chemist) came to the College in October and involved 70 students from Years 7-10 in constructing a Rube Goldberg machine, then a Live and Explosive Science Show before enjoying a pizza lunch. Students were very enthusiastic and asked lots of questions about University life, courses and science-related jobs. Favourite experiments included the oscillating iodine tube which changed back and forth from blue to orange, smashing flowers frozen in liquid nitrogen, and exploding bubbles mixed with liquid nitrogen. Congratulations to all the participating students who represented the top 20 students in each year group for their Science Fair experiment projects completed in Term 3.

Year 10 Visual Art Murals

The style embraces a mash-up of opposites like realism and pure abstraction, organic expression and geometric pattern, and they tend to rely on typography that works within the design.

Students had to work in groups from the design to the production, working collaboratively with others of differing interests, aesthetic preferences and skill sets. The murals are on MDF board 8x4ft. The challenges of the task are converting a tattoo style to a mural, working in groups and working on such a large scale. They will be on display around the school soon.

The Transition Project helps minimise the stress of the move to high school, supports students to develop independence and resilience, and connect positively with their local community. Parents and children alike have reported feeling more confident in choosing independent travel options, and staff have observed reduced vehicle traffic around the school.

BSC has also achieved Platinum Accreditation status, thanks to the Green Team's work on the Your Move Program throughout the 2018 year.
